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## The March of the Living 2025 took place at the Auschwitz Museum in Poland

Nearly 100 Lithuanian representatives participated in the international event to commemorate the 80th anniversary of the end of World War II.

The traditional March of the Living took place on April 24 at the Auschwitz State Museum. Young people and representatives of older generations, including Holocaust survivors, walk a symbolic route from the former Nazi concentration camp Auschwitz I to Auschwitz-Birkenau, a place known for the mass murder of people, primarily Jews. Together, they walked 3.5 kilometers to remember and honor the victims of the Holocaust. This march is called the March of the Living. In 2025, for the fifth time, representatives of the Lithuanian educational community participated in the March of the Living in Poland, with more than 12,000 people from 40 countries. Zingeris said, "It is simply incredible that so many young people from all over the world are here and that there is incredible order and no noise." Polish President Andrzej Duda and Israeli Head of State Isaac Herzog attended the event, as did 80 Holocaust survivors.

The March of the Living honors the victims of the Holocaust at the main Auschwitz-Birkenau memorial. It provides an opportunity for people to socialize and get to know each other. Jewish and Austrian youth mingled with Lithuanian schoolchildren and adults during the march. During the march, which lasted a few kilometers, there was active and friendly interaction: the Jewish youth exchanged badges, bracelets, symbolic signatures, and contact information.

While the Lithuanian delegation was initially all Lithuanian, it became international as we approached the Auschwitz-Birkenau site.

This year's March of the Living event was attended by teachers and students from sixteen schools with Tolerance Education Centers, representatives from six educational and cultural institutions, and members of the Šiauliai County Jewish community.

Following the March of Life event at the Auschwitz Museum, the Lithuanian representatives visited the former Nazi death camp Treblinka, where approximately 750,000 to 800,000 people were murdered between 1942 and 1943. [More](#)
